SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Governor Cuomo presented his State Budget proposal in mid-January. He proposed increasing school aid by \$2.1 billion over the next two years and eliminating the Gap Elimination Adjustment. This initially sounded like great news for districts. A closer look, however, indicates that many districts such as Franklin will not see a substantial benefit from the elimination of the GEA (\$9,300.00). A zero percent tax cap further complicates the revenue districts may seek. The overall picture for Franklin results in a loss of three hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$330,000) under the current Governor's proposal. This is the case for many rural schools in our area. I must remain hopeful that the State legislators will increase the amount of funding proposed and narrow the gap that currently exists for many districts in New York State.

I have continued to communicate with our Assemblyman, Senator and the Governor's office about the need for appropriate and equitable funding of public education. Elimination of the Gap Elimination Adjustment program alone is not enough. The current foundation formula is flawed and does not result in a fair distribution of funding for Franklin Central School.

Thank you for your support of our school and the students we serve.

BUDGET OVERVIEW

The 2016-17 proposed budget increases total District spending by \$146,050. The proposed increase in the tax levy is 2.66% for next year. The following schedule presents a comparison of the proposed expenditures for the 2015-16 and 2016-17 budget:

For 2016-17 we are expecting a small increase in state aid over the current year. However, the increase in aid will not be sufficient to cover projected increases in special education related costs and employee benefits and salaries. As a result, our preliminary budget left us with a budget gap of approximately \$332,000. To tackle this gap all aspects of

District operations were reviewed. To close the budget gap the following occurred:

- All non-instructional departments are maintaining zero budget growth for the 2016-17 year.
- District staffing patterns were reviewed and reorganized which resulted in the elimination of 2.5 positions. This figure consists of the reduction of three high school teachers and our librarian from full time to part-time and the elimination of one part-time teaching position. In addition, we will not be filling two academic support positions that will be vacant at the end of the year due to staff retirements.

The Board of Education worked very hard to keep as many programs in tact as possible. In addition, because of some creative scheduling we are confident that we will not be losing many electives at the high school level.

What Will be the Effect on my Taxes?

Tax rates vary from town to town and are affected by many factors beyond the District's control such as Assessed Values, State Equalization Rates and STAR Exemptions. Actual tax rates will not be set until August when New York State finalizes equalization rates. The proposed increase in the tax levy is 2.66% for next year. The following example provides a simplified illustration of the tax levy impact, with all other factors remaining equal.

'Total tax figures are adjusted for reductions from STAR. The basic STAR exemption for 2015-16 school taxes was \$397.

SCHOOL DISTRICT VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

VOTER OUALIFICATIONS

- Or any other evidence of residency School District





ANALYSIS OF THE 2016-17 PROPOSED BUDGET

PROGRAM COMPONENT

This represents \$4,838,308 or 70% of the budget.

The Program Component includes all costs directly associated with the instruction of students. Included in this component are salaries and benefits of teaching staff; textbooks; classroom supplies, materials and equipment; extra-curricular activities; interscholastic athletic programs and certain BOCES services. This component also includes the costs associated with operating the District's transportation program.

CAPITAL COMPONENT

This represents \$982,623 or 15% of the budget.

The Capital Component includes the costs to maintain and operate school facilities. Included in this component are utilities; custodial salaries and benefits; custodial supplies, materials and equipment and debt service payments. This component also includes the costs associated with upgrading the District bathrooms.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMPONENT

This represents \$1,057,567 or 15% of the budget.

The Administrative Component includes anticipated expenditures associated with the administrative, business and supervisory costs of the District. Included in this component are costs relating to the Board of Education, Office of the Superintendent, the Business Office and the Principal's Office. It also includes certain BOCES related expenditures and legal and auditing services.

NEW YORK STATE AID

This accounts for \$3,802,572 or 55% of total revenue.

This category represents NYS Aid in all categories including regular operating, transportation and building aid.

REAL PROPERTY TAX

This accounts for \$2,608,926 or 38% of total revenue.

This is the local share of the budget, to be raised through the school tax levy. A portion of this amount will be paid for many residents through the NYS STAR program.

INTERFUND TRANSFERS

This accounts for \$75,000 or 1% of total revenue.

This is a transfer from the debt service fund to cover the cost of obligated debt service payments.

FUND BALANCE

This accounts for \$335,000 or 5% of total revenue.

This category consists of funds accumulated over the past several years to be used to offset taxes. Also included in this category is the use of certain reserve fund money designated for particular purposes such as retirement system contributions and capital projects.

OTHER REVENUES (MISCELLANEOUS)

This accounts for \$57,000 or 1% of total revenue.

Included here are funds received from interest earnings; penalties on school tax payments, gifts and donation and refunds of prior years obligations.

BUS PURCHASE

On May 17, residents will also vote on the purchase of a 48 passenger bus at a cost not to exceed \$115,000. If approved, this purchase will be funded with a bus bond anticipation note. The cost of the bus is 70% State Aid reimbursable; resulting in a net cost to District residents of \$34,500. The District replaces buses on a 10-year cycle. This practice allows us to keep the bus fleet in good operating condition without spending excessive amounts on maintenance and repairs.

DCMO BOCES TO ADMINISTER SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY EXAM

The New York State Education Department awarded a grant to DCMO BOCES to administer the high school equivalency exam. The Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASCTM) exam, was previously administered by the Norwich City School District and most recently at the Norwich High School. Testing at the DCMO BOCES Chenango Campus will start in April of 2016.

The 2016 general test schedule is as follows: April 4-5, June 6-7, July 11-12, October 3-4, and December 12-13. Individuals interested in testing can apply for the exam by calling 607-335-1381. Eligibility requirements, application form, and more information are also available on the *www.learnatboces.com* home page and the New York State Adult Education website, *www.acces.nysed.gov/hse*.

Adult and Continuing Education Director Audrey Benkenstein commented, "We are very excited to add the TASCTM administration to the menu of services already offered by DCMO BOCES. We are equally pleased that the high school equivalency exam will continue to be given locally." Benkenstein also commented that the local test initiative hopes to encourage individuals lacking a high school diploma or equivalent to enroll in a preparation program and begin working toward their credential.



Typical Adolescence? or Signs that Require Help?



Adolescence is a time of change—change that prepares a young person for adult life. Young people begin to develop their own beliefs, cultural values and sexual identity, and begin thinking about the future. These changes can lead a youth to turn away from family and toward friends, to question authority and take risks. We also know that mental health problems often appear during adolescence. How do we distinguish between normal adolescent behavior and signs of serious mental health problems?

There are a number of signs and symptoms to look for. If a young person is experiencing several at one time and the symptoms are causing problems in their ability to study, work or relate to others, he or she should be seen by a mental health professional. Youth with suicidal thoughts or thoughts of harming others need immediate attention.

SOME SIGNS OF POTENTIAL PROBLEMS:

- Social withdrawal, withdrawal from activities or a loss of interest in others
- Problems with concentration, memory, speech or difficulty performing familiar tasks
- Increased sensitivity to, or avoidance of, sounds, smells, touch, sights or stimulating situations
- Apathy or feeling disconnected or a sense of unreality
- Illogical thinking, exaggerated beliefs or magical thinking
- Nervousness or fear or suspiciousness of others
- Odd or unusual behavior

- Dramatic sleep or appetite changes or a decline in personal care
- · Rapid or dramatic mood changes

MAKING A DIFFERENCE: PROTECTIVE FACTORS IN A YOUTH'S LIFE

What causes one youth to struggle with addiction, mental health problems or risky behaviors and another seem to coast through high school unencumbered by anxiety, depression or substance abuse? We all know that there is a complex maze of factors such as genetics, family connections and community that impact each youth. Protective factors increase a young person's likelihood of success and risk factors increase the likelihood of mental health problems or substance abuse.

When students enter high school, they face social, emotional, and educational challenges. What's exciting is that schools, teachers and parents can improve student outcomes by increasing protective factors and reducing risk factors.

BUILDING A POSITIVE SCHOOL CULTURE

A positive school culture is linked to improved academic and behavioral outcomes and helps create a sense of acceptance and attachment to school life. This shapes students' feelings and attitudes, which in turn impact on their academic performance and mental health.

To build a positive school culture, schools are encouraged to introduce or strengthen programs that provide opportunities for students and teachers to interact with one another on an informal basis and provide activities that promote positive peer bonding such as recess, clubs or school buddy programs. Schools should promote high academic expectations for their students and place more emphasis on mastery of a subject matter and less on competition and relative ability. A positive relationship with at least one adult who is not the parent, is a strong protective factor. Therefore, teachers who get to know their students can make a difference in their lives.

CREATING A PROTECTIVE SCHOOL CULTURE:


FRANKLIN HONOR SOCIETY RAISES MONEY FOR CHARITY

10 tips Nutrition

kid-friendly veggies and fruits



10 tips for making healthy foods more fun for children

Encourage children to eat vegetables and fruits by making it fun. Provide healthy ingredients and let kids help with preparation, based on their age and skills. Kids may try foods they avoided in the past if they helped make them.

smoothie creations Blend fat-free or low-fat yogurt or milk with fruit pieces and crushed ice. Use fresh, frozen, canned, and even overripe fruits. Try bananas, berries, peaches, and/or pineapple. If you freeze the fruit first, you can even skip the ice!

delicious dippers Kids love to dip their foods. Whip up a quick dip for veggies with yogurt and seasonings such as herbs or garlic. Serve with raw vegetables like broccoli, carrots, or cauliflower. Fruit chunks go great with a yogurt and cinnamon or vanilla dip.

caterpillar kabobs Assemble chunks of melon, apple, orange, and pear on skewers for a fruity kabob. For a raw veggie version, use vegetables like zucchini, cucumber, squash, sweet peppers, or tomatoes.

personalized pizzas Set up a pizza-making station in the kitchen. Use whole-wheat English muffins, bagels, or pita bread as the crust. Have tomato sauce, low-fat cheese, and cut-up vegetables or fruits for toppings. Let kids choose their own favorites. Then pop the pizzas into the oven to warm.

fruity peanut butterfly Start with carrot sticks or celery for the body. Attach wings made of thinly sliced apples with peanut butter and decorate with halved grapes or dried fruit.

frosty fruits

Frozen treats are bound to be popular in the warm months. Just put fresh fruits such as melon chunks in the freezer (rinse first). Make "popsicles" by inserting sticks into peeled bananas and freezing.

bugs on a log Use celery, cucumber, or carrot sticks as the log and add peanut butter. Top with dried fruit such as raisins, cranberries, or cherries, depending on what bugs you want!

homemade trail mix Skip the pre-made trail mix and make your own. Use your favorite nuts and dried fruits, such as unsalted peanuts, cashews, walnuts, or sunflower seeds mixed with dried apples, pineapple, cherries, apricots, or raisins. Add whole-grain cereals to the mix, too.

potato person Decorate half a baked potato. Use sliced cherry tomatoes, peas, and low-fat cheese on the potato to make a funny face.

put kids in charge Ask your child to name new veggie or fruit creations. Let them arrange raw veggies or fruits into a fun shape or design.

The boys finished their regular season by beating Edmeston at home to force a three-way tie with Richfield Springs and Edmeston. Through a blind draw, Edmeston and Franklin were selected to fill out the inaugural post season format that the Tri-Valley adopted for this year. Franklin received a #3 seed in the league tournament and had to travel to take on the Morris Mustangs. Franklin defeated the Mustangs by a score of 55-33. That win sent the Devils into the league Championship against the defending league champs and a team that had not lost to a Tri-Valley team all year.

The win marked the second time in team history that Franklin had won a Tri-Valley League title. The only other time was in 2002.

The Purple Devils also placed two players onto the Tri-Valley League all-star team: **Derek Beers** and **Max Carey**.
