


















Art Club & SADD Help Decorate the Town




Purple Devil Speed & Agility Camp Continues . . .

Science Grades 4-6

We have been focusing on life science in grades 4-6. The fourth grade has recently completed a unit on organism structures and behaviors. To demonstrate their learning, students designed a zoo and organized animals in an unusual way - by their best sense receptors! The zoos were very creative and well thought out. Do you know what an earworm is or have you ever had one? An earworm is a song that gets stuck in your head and you can't help but sing it over and over. Fifth grade certainly had one as they listened to, "Owl Pellets," while they dissected owl pellets. They found many different bones from mice, voles and birds. They not only made connections to what we had been discussing in science class, but to "There's an Owl in the Shower;" which they had been reading with Mrs. DeCarlo in ELA class.


We are currently learning about how energy flows within an ecosystem through food chains and webs. Sixth graders are taking their understanding of ecosystems to the next level. They are investigating how interactions between organisms affect an ecosystem. They have been debating whether hunting should be used for population control and finding matches by playing, "Find My Ecosystem Buddy." We are hoping to answer our student wondering question, "Do fish bathe?" Well, what do YOU think? Finally, we were all sad to say goodbye to Brian Ziemann who has completed his student teaching. He has had such a positive impact on the students and we were lucky to have been part of his journey to becoming a teacher. It has certainly been a bittersweet end to 2020.

FCEF Continues to Support Franklin Area Youth



What You Can do if You are at Higher Risk of Severe Illness from COVID-19

Are You at Higher Risk for Severe Illness?



Based on what we know now, those at higher risk for severe illness from COVID-19 are:

Older adults

People of any age with the following:

- Chronic kidney disease
- COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
- Immunocompromised state (weakened immune system) from solid organ transplant
- Obesity (body mass index [BMI] of 30 or higher)
- Serious heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, or cardiomyopathies
- Sickle cell disease
- Type 2 diabetes mellitus

Here's What You Can do to Help Protect Yourself



Limit contact with other people as much as possible.



Wash your hands often.



Avoid close contact (6 feet, which is about two arm lengths) with people who are sick.



Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.



Avoid all cruise travel and non-essential air travel.

Call your healthcare professional if you are sick.

Franklin CSD Begins Issuing Chromebooks

Using a combination of monies from the technology budget and the Corona Virus Relief Act, Franklin CSD has purchased 311 Chromebooks. We have received 209 so far and have begun issuing them to students.

WHAT EXACTLY IS A CHROMEBOOK?

A Chromebook is a laptop of a different breed. Instead of Windows or Mac OS, Chromebooks run Google's Chrome OS, which in turn is built from Linux. These machines are designed to be used while connected to the Internet, with applications and documents living in the cloud.

There is very little operating system to speak of and programs cannot be installed; essentially, it's just a portable version of Google's Chrome browser.


At first, the concept of a browser-only laptop seems a little strange. You may have already noticed that the majority of our students' every-day computing tasks can be done via the web, internet connection allowing. As the Chromebook only needs to run a web browser it does not require an expensive device and becomes a very cost-effective means of getting technology to students. The student version has an 11.6" touchscreen, is very light and portable, and folds completely open to be used as a tablet. There is a teacher version that has a slightly larger touch-screen and allows for additional connections to classroom projectors and document cameras.

Aside from the cost benefit of the Chromebooks, their simplicity means that they are very fast to start up, have great battery life, and require minimal maintenance. Updates are automatically installed and they have security features built-in, so there's no need to run separate antivirus software. Additionally, our requirement to filter the internet still takes place no matter where in the world our students use their Chromebook.

WHAT CAN STUDENTS DO WITH A CHROMEBOOK?

Each students' Google Drive account is baked into the file manager which makes opening, organizing, and managing files relatively simple. Google's office productivity is also built in, along with Google Classroom as our primary online platform and Gmail for communication. We have a custom Chrome App Store that allows only approved apps and extensions to be installed. We can also remotely install apps and extensions that we know teachers want students to have, like we did with Zoom.





This integration of all of Google's applications allows students to share and collaborate in real time while all utilizing the same software on the same hardware platform. Also, the Chromebooks ensure teachers can create lesson plans and present content without worry that a student is unable to participate.
